Lots of people own com-panies, but Lee Abrams is different. He's 15 years old and he's been in business for more

"I knew it would be a challenge. If somebody else could do it, I figured I could too," he said. He's President and Janitor He's president of the com-pany and it's only employe, but he says if the business keeps growing he'll have to get some help. He did have help.

help. He did have help, tho, when he decided to form a company. He studied trade magazines, consulted business men about the procedures for starting a company, and received infor-mation from other companies involved in recording. Then he went to work. He

Then he went to work. He made one record, which he doesn't talk about too much because it wasn't played often. But, in September he recorded two selections by The Meying two selections by The Moving Violation, a vocal and in-strumental group which violation, a vocal and in-strumental group which he m an ages. The selections, "Three for Love" and "This Time," still are being pro-moted, and Lee says the disc probably will go on sale next month month.

The Job Has Headaches Lee says his job is exciting, but not without problems. "The main problems are securing a copyright and distribution," he

says. "There's so much work in-"There's so much work in-volved in getting national dis-tribution of the record," he said. Lee said to have a top selling record, it has to be distributed in every city.

So he's in the process of getting contracts with promo-tion men in major cities who will see that his records are

will see that his records are distributed to radio stations. Hopes for Stardom Lee says the main reason his record is not yet on the market is that it has not received enough air play. He hopes, tho, that by hiring promotion men the record will become wellknown

Lee does some promoting on his own, too. He advertises in trade releases and billboard and broadcasting magazines.



Lee says his parents, Dr. and Mrs. Walter Abrams, think his business venture is a "pretty business venture is a good idea."

Looking a bit to the futúre, Lee says he would like to go into broadcasting or commer-cial aviation. "I want to take flying lessons with the money I earn in the record business," he says he says.
